The Department of English in collaboration with IQAC, Baptist College organised the 5th edition of the Literature Fest on 29th October, 2022 under the theme, "Learning Spaces." The first session was chaired by Dr. Tsenbeni, Asst. Prof, English department, Baptist College. Dr. Kekuchol Pusa, Principal, Baptist College highlighted on the importance of such an event which aims at promoting reading, writing, creativity and the importance of providing the platform to share one's values towards art. He also mentioned that Baptist College is privileged to be the first institution to be hosting the Literature Fest since it's inception in 2016. Dr. Sentinaro, Head, Department of English, Baptist College in her remark spoke on the uniqueness of such an event, like the Literature Fest which is aimed to bring together renowned writers, literary experts, thinkers, politicians, and artists from varied industries like art, music, film etc. on a single platform to share ideas and engage in a meaningful debate. Befitting the occasion, a heartfelt tribute was paid to Prof. Temsula Ao in reading Ao's poem,' October'.

The day long events saw a host of activities like the Book Fest, Poetry workshop, roleplay, Book exchange, food stall, Art gallery, Short Story competition, charity counter, Reading club, Film screening, musicians, stage plays and enactment, historical narration, spoken word poetry, ted talk on entrepreneurship, awareness on constitutional rights etc with a host of judges, resource persons and invitees from various areas of expertise. Coping with Exam Anxiety Disorder

In a rat - race competitive world, Exam-time, for most, can be the most unsettling time. Pressure to do well in examinations can be overwhelming and can affect your mental health. It causes untold stress, tension, anxiety leading to depression. At such taunting times. 'Self-care' is one aspect that should not be overlooked. Self- care is the little things we do to look after our own mental health. While it is important to do well in your exams, it is equally important to take out time to look after yourself by doing things like eating and sleeping well. There is no, "one-size-fits-all," solution to doing away with exam stress but you can alleviate the stress level by following some simple steps:

- (1) Do not plan an unrealistic revision plan. It won't help you and will put you under unnecessary stress.
- (2) It helps to study smart as we are living in a world where thinking smart is equally important to working hard.
- (3) Avoid last minute preparation. It can totally stress you out and can be the reason to your failure.
- (4) Some people prefer to read, others find it helpful to make notes or memorise. While others prefer to discuss. Do what works out for you.
- (5) Overthinking can be really harmful while preparing for an examination. It can be stressful when you think everyone is doing better than you, spending more time on revision than you. For all you know, they could be stressing out as much as you.
- (6) It is also important to take short breaks in between to refresh your mind. Make a list of all the things you enjoy, and find time to do them. This can reduce your stress levels, improve your mood, and help you feel refreshed and relaxed. There is no need to feel guilty for taking some "Me-time" to unwind.
- (7) The most reliable and fool- proof advice in an exam scenario, is to stay composed, master whatever you know and do not be anxious about all that you might have missed out lest you may forget even those you have studied. ONE DAY WORKSHOP ON Writing Short Stories: Reimagining Little Stories ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

A One day workshop on writing short stories was held under the tittle, Reimagining Little Stories. The workshop was organised by the Department of English in collaboration with the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), held at Rivenburgs Chapel Hall, Kohima on 26th of April, 2022 from 10:00 A.M. to 12:10 P.M.

The workshop was divided into two sessions. In the first session, a formal programme was held with Dr. Tsenbeni as the chair person and Mr. Lhülü Keyho as the speaker. Mr. Keyho in his talk emphasised on the use of folk tales and short stories of various Naga tribes and how to expand them to recreate a lengthier version of stories or novels. The speaker also brought in examples

on how writters use short stories to recreate novels. The first session came to an end with the resource person, sharing a story about a man from Phek district, who owed money to his village men.

The second session resumed with a delightful poetry performance by Mr. Limatoshi Longkumer, B.A 6th Semester, English Department. After which, Mr. Keyho made the students do a hands on activity by making them practice the art of writing short stories. The students were asked to create a beginning, middle and an end of a story of there own. He stated the importance of having a catchy beginning and an ending in a story that allows the readers to stay interested. He also pointed out certain techniques of writing short stories by giving pointers such as brevity of the story, setting of time frame, having a certain topography or location and most importantly localising the story by using vernaculars. The session ended with Mr. Kezhalelhou Zatsu, Co-ordinator, IQAC pronouncing the vote of thanks and closing the session.
